Warrant for Annual Town Meeting, March 1892.

State of Maine.

To Geo. P. Billings, a Constable of the Town of Eden,
Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine,
you are hereby required to notify and warn the
inhabitants of the Town of Eden, qualified by law to
vote in town affairs to meet at Music Hall Bar
Harbor, on Monday the seventh of March, A.D. 1892,
at ten o'clock A.M. to act on the following articles,
to wit: -

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside
at said meeting.

Article 2. - To choose a Town Clerk for
ensuing year.

Article 3. - To hear reports of town officers and
Committee and act thereon.

Article 4. - To choose Selectmen and Assessors
for ensuing year.

Article 5. - To choose a town Treasurer for en-
suing year.

Article 6. - To choose an Overseer or Overseers
of the Poor.

Article 7. - To choose a Superintending School
Committee or Supervisor of Schools.

Article 8. - To choose Road Commissioners
or Road Commissioners.

Article 9. To choose Constables.

Article 10. To choose Fence Viewers.

Article 11. To choose Field Drivers and Pound Keepers.

Article 12. To choose Surveyors of Lumber and

Lorenzo Mayo and land of E. M. Hamor
and other to the shore at Clark's Cove.

Article 22. - To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to execute a release deed of any right the town may have in "Vale Avenue", a narrow way leading from the Woodbury Road across land of Charles T. How.

Article 23. - To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to establish the southern line of the school-house lot on School street which said line coincides with the northern line of W. H. Davis' lot as shown on plan of J. E. Savage dated Feb. 22, 1892, and to execute release deed for same.

Article 24. - To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to construct a sewer along the Schooner Head Road from the main sewer as now constructed, southerly to some point near the entrance to the Dorr Place.

Article 25. - To see if the town will vote to continue the survey up the Highbrook Road to a point near Geo. M. Whelan's private way.

Article 26. - To see if the town will refund Geo. M. Whelan and others for amount expended in building sidewalk on Highbrook Road.

Article 27. - To see if the town will vote what compensation shall be paid A. D. Young for rent of watering tub.

Article 28. - To see if the town will establish a moving to fasten the garbage scow to, when dumping garbage.

Article 29. - To see if the town will accept a list of jurors as prepared by the Municipal Officers.

Article 55. - To raise money to pay Bar Harbor Water Company for use of water for fire and municipal purposes for the ensuing year.

Article 56. - To see if the town will vote to build a store-house for town property and raise money for same.

Article 57. - To see if the town will raise a sum of money to help defray the expense of stocking ponds with fish.

Article 58. - To see if the town will make a contract for purchasing crushed rock for its roads and sidewalks.

Article 59. - To see if the town will authorize the Road Commissioner to repair that portion of Holland Avenue which lies between Cottage and Mt. Desert Streets.

Article 60. - To see if the town will raise money to reimburse school districts for school property taken.

Article 61. - To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk on the easterly side of Holland Avenue, from Cottage street to West Street.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Engine House Hall, Bar Harbor, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the 3rd, 4th and 5th days of March from eight o'clock in the forenoon till five o'clock in the afternoon of each day, for the purpose of hearing and deciding upon the applications of those claiming the right to vote in said town and that no names will be received later than five o'clock in the afternoon on the secular day next preceding the day of election, and no names will be received on the day of election except such as were upon the list of the previous year and have been inadvertently omitted by the Selectmen.

March 1892.

In accordance with the foregoing warrant the Inhabitants of Eden, qualified to vote in town affairs, met on Monday March 7, A. D. 1892, at ten o'clock A. M. at Music Hall, in Bar Harbor, and proceeded to business as follows: -

Article 1. - Voted: That L. B. Deary be Moderator to preside at said meeting.
Mr. Deary was duly sworn by S. N. Rich the town clerk, and entered upon his duties as Moderator.

Article 2. Voted: by a unanimous vote that Samuel N. Rich be town clerk for the ensuing year, and he was sworn by L. B. Deary, Moderator.

Article 3. - Voted: That the reports of Town Officers and the several Committees be accepted, and also that a vote of thanks be extended to the said officers and committees for satisfactory reports.

x Article 4. - For First Selectman and Assessor,
Blithen S. Higgins had 236 votes,
Charles F. Paine " 196 "
and Mr. Higgins was declared elected.

For second Selectman and Assessor,
Alonzo Higgins had 241 votes
Daniel W. Brewer had 80 votes
and James E. Hamor had 43 votes

Millard L. Hamor had 177 votes
and B. F. Wiggins had 128 votes.
Mr. Hamor was declared elected as first
Commissioner for Commissioner of the

Article 24. - Voted: To Indefinitely postpone said Article relating to the construction of a Sewer along the Schomer Head Road to some point near the entrance to the Dove Place.

Article 25. - Voted: That the matter of continuing the Sewer up the Neighbrook Road to a point near Geo. M. Wheeler's private way be indefinitely postponed.

And the following resolution was passed.

Resolved: That it is the sense of this meeting that if practicable, the sewer system be extended so as to accommodate the Cottages of Mr. Howard and others in that vicinity, and that the Selectmen be instructed to make a Survey to determine the most feasible route and probable cost and to report under a proper article in the warrant at the next town meeting or at a special meeting. -

Article 26. - Voted: That Art. 26. be indefinitely postponed.

Article 27. - Voted: To pay O. H. Young \$10.00 per year for two years for rent of Watering Tub.

Article 28. Voted: That a mooring be established to fasten the garbage scow to when dumping garbage, said mooring to be placed outside of Wheeler's Porcupine Island. - The Selectmen to have the supervision of establishing said mooring and to see that Mr. S. W. Rodick performs his part of the contract in the placing the mooring in the place agreed upon.
