Written Permit to The New England Telephone & Telegraph Company.

Whereas the New England Telephone & Telegraph Company, a corporation established and existing under the laws of the state of New York and doing business in the state of Maine, by its petition filed in the office of the Clerk of the town of Eden on the nineteenth day of December A.D. 1891. at ten o'clock A.M. made application to the Selectmen of said town for a written permit to construct and maintain its lines and run its wires upon and along the highways and public roads of the town of Eden aforesaid, and;

Whereas, upon said application it was ordered by said Selectmen that no personal notice be given and that public notice to all persons interested be given by publishing in some newspaper printed in said town a copy of said application and of the order of the ^{said} Selectmen thereon attested by the town clerk of said town the last publication to be fourteen days before the time of hearing appointed by the Selectmen, and Whereas, before proceeding with the hearing we first received conclusive proof that such order of justice had been fully complied with and public notice given as required by law, and after having adjudicated that such order of notice had been complied with and such notice given;

Now therefore having considered all of the matters relating to said petition and having heard all of the parties, we have determined and adjudicated to give and hereby do give written permission to the said New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, for the purpose of carrying out its objects, to construct and maintain its lines and run its wires ^{upon} along any of the highways and public roads in the town of Eden aforesaid. Its posts shall be reasonably straight wooden poles, set at least three and one half feet in the ground and projecting not less than twenty feet above the ground.

The posts may be located within the limits of said highways and public roads; but so as not to interfere with public travel, said posts may be located upon either side of said roads, and the wires may cross from one side to the other of said roads wherever said Company may desire. The wires may be run from pole to pole, upon, along and across said highways and public roads at a height of at least fifteen feet above the ground except at places where the wires cross any highway or public road, and in such places they shall be run at a height of at least twenty feet above the ground. And as incidental to the rights and powers hereby granted and permitted, said Company may do any and all things necessary to enable it to fully carry out its purposes in the manner above specified. After the erection of said lines, having first given such Company or its agent opportunity to be heard, the municipal officers may direct any alteration in the location or erection of such posts and in the height of the wires.
