Bar Harbor, Feb. 20. 1895. -

To the Municipal Officers of the Town of Eden,
Hancock County, Maine.

I hereby offer the Town through you for the strip of land next to mine, upon which my buildings are said to extend, the sum of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7500) per acre.

The strip of land for which this offer is made is to extend from the eastern line of my lot, to a line parallel thereto and so far therefrom as to include such part of my buildings as may be upon land of the town.

If I cannot agree with you as to the amount of land included, I propose that the area shall be determined by three referees, one to be selected by the Municipal Officers, one by myself, and one by the first two.

Mr. Eben M. Hamor proposed that a grand Celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the town of Eden which will occur in 1896. A rising vote was called for to support him in this idea. - A unanimous vote in his favor was the result.

Voted that a committee of seven persons acting with the selectmen be appointed by the Moderator, to serve without pay to consider the question of a Municipal Celebration in 1896, of the hundredth anniversary of the organization of the Town of Eden, said Committee to make a report at the next Annual town meeting with their recommendations.

Roberts and twelve other inhabitants of and owners of cultivated land in said town to alter Main Street in said town, gave at least seven days notice of our intentions to lay out the same by posting written notice of our intentions in three public and conspicuous places in said town and in the vicinity of said proposed alteration to wit: - One in Engine House Hall Bar Harbor, one in the Post Office at Bar Harbor and one on a post in said Main Street, all public and conspicuous places in said town and in the vicinity of said alteration, describing said alteration in each, and stating in each the time and place at which we would meet to view and lay out the same. We met at the time and place described in above notice, which notice forms a part of this return; and after personally examining the proposed alteration, and hearing all persons interested were of opinion that an alteration as asked for would be of public convenience and benefit, we then and there laid out said alteration as follows: —

Beginning at an iron bolt in front of the store of Green & Reynolds nearly opposite the entrance and in the Western line of the present street: said bolt bears South fifteen degrees and fifteen minutes West ($S. 15^{\circ} 15' W.$) and is forty-seven feet from a stone monument which marks an angle in the present street line, and also marks the southeast corner of land formerly owned by the Eastern Railroad Company; thence deflecting five degrees to the West of the said present ^{street} line, and running North ten degrees and fifteen minutes East ($N. 10^{\circ} 15' E.$) two hundred and sixty-seven (267) feet to an iron bolt at or near the southerly line of West Street which bears North thirty-nine degrees and forty minutes East, and is five and five tenths feet distant from the Brewer Hotel; thence deflecting eighty one degrees and thirty minutes to the right and running South eighty-eight degrees
