Warrant for Annual Town Meeting.

State of Maine, Hancock co.
To George O. Billings, a Constable of the
Town of Eden,
Greeting;

In the name of the State
of Maine you are hereby required to notify
and warn the inhabitants of the town of
Eden qualified by law to vote in town affairs
to meet at Music hall, Bar Harbor, on
Monday, the first day of March, A.D. 1897,
at ten o'clock A.M., to act on the
following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside
at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose a Town Clerk for
ensuing year.

Article 3. To hear report of town officers and
committee and act thereon.

Article 4. To choose Selectmen and Assessors
for ensuing year.

Article 5. To choose a Town Treasurer
for ensuing year.

Article 6. To choose an Overseer or Overseers
of the Poor.

Article 7. To choose two members of
Superintending School Committee.

Article 8. To choose a Road Commissioner or Road Commissioners.

Article 9. To choose Constables.

Article 10. To choose Fence Viewers

Article 11. To choose Pound Keepers.

Article 12. To choose Surveyors of Lumber and Measures of Wood and Bark.

Article 13. To choose Weighers of Hay and Grain.

Article 14. To choose an Agent of Town School Fund.

Article 21. To see if the town will accept the report of the selection on a sewer as laid out by them beginning at Cottage street and extending to Mount Desert street over what is known as Roberts avenue.

Article 22. To see if the town will accept the report of the selectmen on a sewer as laid out by them beginning at the southerly terminus of the present sewer on the highway near Mr. Edward Cole's entrance gate and extending along the highway to a point near the entrance gate to the Dorr place.

Article 23. To see if the town will accept the report of the selectmen on a sewer as laid out by them beginning at the manhole in the Forest Avenue branch sewer where it crosses Eagle Lake road and running easterly within the limits of said Eagle Lake road to a point near E. M. Fain's residence.

Article 24. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell the Isaac Mayo place so-called.

Article 25. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell the Nathaniel Cousins' place so-called.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a term of years certain real estate of Island Lodge No. 120 Independent Order of Odd Fellows and fix the length of said term.

Article 27. To fix compensation of Superintendent of Schools.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote that the money raised for repairs of roads and bridges shall be expended by the Selectmen and Road Commissioners acting together.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote that the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department shall have the expending of the money raised for Fire Department.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote how the taxes shall be collected for the ensuing year.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote what discount shall be allowed on taxes and for what time.

Article 32. To fix compensation of Treasurer and Collector.

Article 33. To see if the town will establish by laws to regulate and license vehicles used for conveying freight and baggage in the streets of War Harbor, to compel persons driving vehicles or riding bicycles to keep to the right of the middle of the road, to compel persons riding bicycles to keep off the sidewalks and to regulate in other respects, vehicles used in said town.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to buy a stone crusher and a steam roller.

Article 35. To see if the town will designate the location of a plant suitable for furnishing crushed stone for roads.

Article 36. To see if the town will make by-laws respecting infectious diseases and health, and amend its existing by-laws on that subject.

Article 37. To see if the town will vote to construct a piece of stone road and employ a competent engineer to make plans and supervise the construction of said road.

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to locate a street light on Holland avenue.

Article 39. To see if the town will vote and instruct the Selectmen to receive bids for sprinkling streets with the right to reject any or all bids.

Article 40. To raise money to defray town charges.

Article 41. To raise money to pay principal on town notes.

Article 42. To raise money to pay interest on notes and orders.

Article 43. To raise money for support of poor.

Article 44. To raise money for common schools.

Article 45. To raise money to repair school property.

Article 46. To raise money for repairs of roads and bridges.

Article 47. To raise money for Free High schools.

Article 48. To raise money for text books & supplies.

Article 49. To raise money to construct and repair sidewalks at Bar Harbor.

Article 58. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to construct and repair sidewalks at Hulls Cove.

Article 59. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to support the town team.

Article 60. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to finish the police station.

Article 61. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to pay for services of health officer.

Article 62. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to buy a stone crusher and steam roller.

Article 63. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to construct a ^{piece of} stone road mentioned in Article 37.

Article 64. To see if the town will raise a sum of money sufficient to complete the soldier's monument.

Article 65. To see if the town will raise one hundred dollars and put it in the hands of the Trustees of the Eden Farm club to be expended by them in encouraging the agricultural interests of the town.

Article 66. To see if the town will accept, ratify, adopt and confirm a bill now before the legislature of this state relating to the board of health of the town of Eden and having special reference to health officers; providing that the bill referred to has now or shall be passed by the State legislature at its present session.

Article 67. To hear report of the committee on purchase of Grand Central property appointed by vote of special meeting of September 12, 1896

Article 68. To see if the town will vote to purchase Grand Central Hotel property.

Article 69. To see if the town will vote to hire money for the purpose set forth in next preceding article and to issue its negotiable notes or bonds therefor and to determine the terms and conditions of such notes or bonds.

Article 70. To see what action the town will take in regard to relieving the main sewer between the junction of Main and Cottage streets and Edward Cole's entrance gate.

Article 71. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase a number of Sherman's Bay Harbor Guide books for free distribution in the western cities provided a satisfactory contract can be made.

Article 72. To appoint a committee to contract for and distribute the books.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Engine house hall, Bay Harbor on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the 25, 26 and 27th days of February from nine o'clock in the forenoon till five o'clock in the afternoon of each day for the purpose of hearing and deciding upon the application of those claiming the right to vote in said town and that no names will be received later than five o'clock in the afternoon on the secular day next preceding the day of election and no names will be received on the day of election except such as were upon the list of the previous year and have been inadvertently omitted by the Selectmen.

 The legal Voters of the town of Eden qualified to vote in the affairs of the town, having been duly notified by warrants legally posted and published assembled at the time and place designated in said warrant viz: —

at Music Hall, Bar Harbor, in said town of Eden, Maine on Monday March 1, 1897 at ten o'clock in the forenoon and proceeded to act on the warrant as follows: —

Article 1. Voted That A. F. Palmer be Moderator to preside at said meeting. Mr. Palmer was then duly sworn by the Town Clerk, S. H. Fick and entered upon the duties of his office.

Article 2. Voted by unanimous vote that Samuel H. Fick be Town Clerk for ensuing year and he was duly sworn by the Moderator.

Article 3. Voted: That the printed report of the town officers be accepted.

Voted: That the report of the Centennial committee be accepted; that the thanks of the town be extended to the committee and their report placed on file.

Article 4. To choose Selectmen and Assessors
 For First Selectman, ^{and} Assessors
 B. S. Higgins had 312 votes.
 Alonzo Higgins had 290 votes.
 and B. S. Higgins was declared elected.

For Second Selectman. ^{2nd} Assessor.
 Frank E. Whitmore had 302 votes
 J. O. Bunker Jr. had 281 votes.
 Frank E. Whitmore was declared elected.

For Third Selectman ^{2nd} Assessor.
 On the first and second ballot there was no choice
 The third ballot resulted as follows:—
