Warrant for Annual Town meeting.State of Maine.

Hancock ss.

To George P. Billings, a constable of the  
Town of Eden.Meeting:-

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Eden, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at Music Hall, Bar Harbor, in said town on Monday the sixth day of March A.D. 1899 at ten o'clock A.M. to act on the following articles to wit:-

Article 1- To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.

Article 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3- To hear report of Town Officers and Committees and to act thereon.

Article 4- To choose Selectmen and Assessors for the ensuing year.

Article 5- To choose a Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 6. To choose an Overseer or Overseers of Poor.

Article 7- To choose a member of Superintending School Committee.

Article 8 - To see if the town will vote to choose a Superintendent of Schools.

Article 9 - To choose a Road Commissioner.

Article 10 - To choose Constables.

Article 11 - To choose Fence Viewers.

Article 12 - To choose Pound Keepers.

Article 13 - To choose Surveyors of lumber and Measures of Wood and bark.

Article 14 - To choose Weighers of Hay and Grain.

Article 15 - To choose an Agent of Town School Fund.

Article 16 - To choose Fish and Game Wardens.

Article 17 - To choose Fire Wardens.

Article 18 - To choose a Swant Officer or Swant Officers.

Article 19 - To choose a Collector of Taxes.

Article 20 - To choose a Chief of Fire Department.

Article 21 - To choose all other necessary Town Officers.

a competent man employed at the engine house  
constantly.

Article 28- To raise money to defray town  
charges.

Article 29- To raise money to pay principal  
on town notes -

Article 30- To raise money to pay interest  
on town notes and orders.

Article 31- To raise money for support of poor.

Article 32- To raise money for common schools.

Article 33- To raise money to repair school property.

Article 34- To raise money for Free High Schools.

Article 36. To raise money for repairing roads and bridges.

Article 37. To raise money to construct and repair sidewalks at Port Harbor.

Article 38. To raise money for support of Fire Department.

Article 39. To raise money to construct and repair sewers.

Article 40. To raise money to dispose of garbage.

Article 41. To raise money to light streets.

Article 42. To raise money to sprinkle streets.

Article 43. To raise money to clean streets.

Article 44. To see if the town will raise money to help defray the expenses of Memorial Day.

Article 45. To raise money to pay Bar Harbor Water Company for use of water for fire and municipal purposes for ensuing year.

Article 46. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to construct and repair sidewalks at Hulls Cove.

Article 47- To see if the town will raise a sum of money to repair sidetracks at Salisbury Cove.

Article 48- To see if the town will raise a sum of money to construct and repair sidetracks at Thomas District.

Article 49- To see if the town will raise a sum of money to support the town team.

Article 50- To see if the town will raise a sum of money to pay for services of health officers.

Article 51- To see if the town will raise a sum of money to defray the expenses of rearing and entertaining the American Institute of Instruction or for any other similar purpose and appoint a committee under whose direction the money so raised may be expended.

Article 52- To see if the town will raise a sum of money for a series of open air band concerts during the summer season.

Article 53- To see if the town will raise a sum of money for support of public library.

Article 54- To see if the town will raise one hundred dollars and put it in the hands of the trustees of the Eden Farmers club to be expended by them in encouraging the agricultural interests of the town.

Article 55- To see if the town will vote to call in and pay its outstanding town order.

Article 56 - To see if the town will vote to raise money for the purpose set forth in the next preceding Article and to issue its negotiable notes or bonds therefor, and to determine the terms and conditions of such notes or bonds and authorize the Selectmen to execute and negotiate the same.

Article 57 - To see if the town will vote to reconstruct the sewer on Mt. Desert Street and raise a sum of money for same.

Article 58 - To see if the town will vote to macadamize Mt. Desert street and build a permanent sidewalk on same, and raise a sum of money for same.

Article 59 - To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk on Roberts Avenue and raise a sum of money for same.

Article 60 - To see if the town will raise a sum of money to suitably furnish the upper room of the Police Station for a Municipal Court room.

Article 61 - To see if the town will vote to accept a sewer as laid out by the Selectmen, beginning at a point in Cottage Street opposite Fred J. Brennan's Cottage and ending at Holland Avenue, and raise a sum of money to construct the same.

Article 62 - To see if the town will vote to accept a sewer as laid out by the Selectmen beginning at a point on Ledge Lane Avenue opposite the cottage of John Sminsky and

ending at the Cromwell's Harbor road, and raise a sum of money to construct the same.

Article 63- To see if the town will raise a sum of money to complete the work of draining Eagle Lake Road begun by Charles Carroll Jackson, by constructing a drain upon the Southern side of the road and necessary connections therewith.

Article 64. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to construct a side walk near the house of Charles Carroll Jackson.

Article 65- To see if the town will vote to locate five electric lights on lower Main street near the entrance to the Dock and Cobs Place.

Article 66- To see if the town will vote to accept a town way as laid out by the selectmen beginning at the Western line of Main Street in the village of Bar Harbor at the point where Edgerwood street, so-called, intersects said Main street, thence running in a westerly direction over said Edgerwood street to School Street.

Article 67- To see if the town will vote to accept a town way as laid out by the selectmen beginning at the Southern line of Cottage Street in Bar Harbor at the point where Maple Avenue, so-called, intersects said Cottage street, thence running in a southerly direction along said Maple Avenue, so-called, to Myrtle Avenue, so-called, thence running in a westerly direction along said Myrtle Avenue to Eden street.

Article 68- To see if the town will vote to purchase a rock crusher for the western end of the town and raise money for the same.

Article 69- To see if the town will vote to accept a town way as laid out by the Selectmen beginning at the north line of George E. Speed's farm on the road leading from Salisbury Cross to Emery District school house, thence running in a general southern direction and ending at the town way leading from said school house to Town Hill near Aunt Betsey's brook, and raise a sum of money to construct same.

Article 70- To see if the town will vote to accept a town way as laid out by the Selectmen beginning at the southern line of the Eagle Lake road, so-called, thence running in a southerly direction about forty rods to a stake, thence easterly about eight rods to a stake, thence northerly about forty rods to the Cornwall's Harbor road.

Article 71- To see if the town will vote to accept a town way as laid out by the Selectmen beginning at the southern terminus of the Hadden Farm road so-called, thence running in a general southeastern direction to the Otter Creek road, so-called, at a point opposite Robin Hood Park, and raise a sum of money to construct same.

Article 72- To see if the town will vote to accept a town way as laid out by the Selectmen beginning at a point in the southern line

of Kets Street in Bar Harbor where a private way intersects said Kets Street. Thence following said private way in a general Southwestern direction to Cromwell's Harbor road.

Article 73- To see if the town will vote to accept a town way as laid out by the Selectmen beginning at a point where Des Isle Avenue intersects First South Street, thence running westerly over said Des Isle Avenue and land of Benjamin Pittredge to a town way leading from Main Street to School Street.

Article 74- To see if the town will vote to give a sum of money not to exceed twenty-five thousand dollars to be expended on its roads and sidewalks, and to issue its negotiable notes and bonds therefor, and to determine the conditions of such notes or bonds and authorize the Selectmen to execute and negotiate the same.

Article 75- To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to assist in maintaining the Bar Harbor Medical and Surgical Hospital.

Article 76- To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to locate an arc light on Ledge Lawn Avenue between the Baptist Church and the Cromwell's Harbor road.

Article 77- To see what action the town will take in regard to draining Eden Street near F. J. Emerys.

Article 78- To see what action the town will take in regard to draining Cottage Street near Bridge Street and Maple Avenue.

Article 79- To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to locate a hydrant on Hancock Street.

Article 80- To see if the town will vote to sell the school house in the Cousins District, so-called, and authorize the selectmen to convey the same.

Article 81- To see if the town will vote to sell the old Town House property, so-called at Salisbury Cove, and authorize the selectmen to convey the same.

Article 82- To see if the town will vote to sell the properties acquired by tax deeds and authorize the selectmen to convey the same.

Article 83- To see if the town will vote to purchase two thousand feet of fire hose, and raise a sum of money for same.

Article 84- To see if the town will vote to purchase one or more hose carts and raise a sum of money for same.

Article 85- To see if the town will vote to build an extension to the engine house, and raise a sum of money for same.

Article 86- To see if the town will vote to purchase a chemical engine, and raise a sum of money for same.

Article 87- To see if the town will vote to construct two new reservoirs at or near the eastern ends of Mt. Desert and Cottage streets, and raise a sum of money for same.

Article 88- To see if the town will vote to instruct the Road Commissioner to widen the sidewalk on the south side of Cottage street, beginning where Cottage street intersects Main Street.

Article 89- To see if the town will vote that the Chief Engineer of the fire department shall have the expending of the money raised for the fire department.

Article 90- To see if the town will raise a sum of money for road widening and deepening Cornwall's Harbor brook.

Article 91- To see what action the town will take relative to providing suitable vaults for the protection of the town records.

Article 92- To see if the town will vote to purchase the Grand Central lot, so-called, or some other lot for municipal purposes.

Article 93- To see if the town will vote to hire money for the purpose set forth in the next preceding article and to issue its negotiable notes or bonds therefor, and to determine the terms and conditions of such notes or bonds and authorize the selectmen to execute and negotiate the same.



Article 94- To see if the town will  
adopt an ordinance relating to the  
construction, maintenance and inspection  
of buildings in the Village of Port Harbor.

Article 95- To see if the town will  
vote to construct a chimney in the corner  
in front of Henry A. Lamford's Cottage on  
Main Street.
