In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Eden qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the Casino, Fox Harbor, in said town, on Monday, the 4th day of March A.D. 1907, at ten o'clock A.M., to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 14- To see if the town will fix the compensation of the Superintendent of Schools.

Article 15- To see if the town will fix the compensation of the Superintending School Committee.

Article 17- To choose a Collector of Taxes.

Article 18- To choose a Chief of Fire Department.

Article 19- To choose an Auditor of Accounts.

Article 20- To choose all other necessary town officers.

Article 21- To see if the town will vote how the taxes shall be collected for the ensuing year.

Article 22 - To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be due, what discount shall be allowed and what interest charged if any, and for what time.

Article 23 - To fix compensation of Treasurer and Collector.

Article 24 - To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to defray town charges.

Article 25 - To raise money to pay principal on town notes and bonds.

Article 26 - To raise money to pay interest on town notes and bonds.

Article 29 - To raise money for Free High School.

Article 30 - To raise money for text books and supplies.

Article 31 - To raise money for repair of School property.

Article 76 - Voted: To raise the sum of Two Thousand Six Hundred dollars to construct a surface drain in the lower end of Sedgeman Avenue.

Article 77 - Voted: To indefinitely postpone.

Article 78 - Voted: To settle the claim of Dr. W. P. Haugh and Mrs. Friend for medical attendance, board and nursing of William Stealey and to raise the sum of One Hundred and thirty seven dollars for said purpose.

Article 79 - Voted: To indefinitely postpone.

Article 80 - Voted: To raise the sum of Eighty dollars for grading the town burial lot in Mountain View Cemetery at West Eden.

Article 81 - Voted: To accept the Town Map prescribed in Article 81.

Article 82 - Voted: That the town accept the town map mentioned in Article 82.

Article 83 - Voted: That the town accept the town map mentioned in Article 83.

Article 84- Voted: To construct the sewer and raise the sum of Nine Hundred and Sixty Dollars for same.

Article 85- Voted: To raise Six Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars to rebuild a part of the Main Street Sewer.
Voted: That the Selectmen be authorized and instructed to employ an expert Sanitary Engineer at an expense of not exceeding Seven Hundred and Eighty Dollars to advise as to the best manner of increasing the efficiency of the present Sewer system in Port Harbor and if it is against his advice to make the repairs contemplated under Article 85.

That the whole matter be referred to the next annual town meeting.

Article 86- Voted: That the town vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to continue the school at Otter Creek for the ensuing year, or to provide instruction for the pupils in some other school, as in their judgment may seem best.

Article 87- Voted: To establish two electric lights on New Mary road.

Article 88- Voted: To indefinitely postpone.

Article 89- Voted: To build a concrete sidewalk on the South side of West Street from Rodick Street to Holland Avenue and to raise One Thousand Dollars for said purpose.

Article 90- Voted: To indefinitely postpone.

Article 91- Voted: To construct a sewer on Mountain Avenue and raise the sum of One Thousand and Seventy Seven dollars for same.

Article 92 - Voted: To indefinitely
postpone.

Article 93 - Voted: To construct a
surface drain on Brady Avenue and raise
the sum of Two hundred dollars for said
purpose.

Article 94 - Motion to raise the sum
of Seven hundred dollars was lost.

Article 95 - Voted: To indefinitely
postpone.

Article 96 - Voted: To raise the sum
of One hundred dollars to repair the old
Town House at Salisbury Cove.

Article 97 - Voted: To construct a
sidewalk on Federal Street and to raise
the sum of Seven hundred and fifty dollars
for same.

Article 98 - Voted: To raise forty
dollars to construct a surface drain on
First South Street.

Article 99 - Voted: To indefinitely postpone

Article 100 - Voted: To indefinitely postpone

Article 101 - Voted: To indefinitely postpone

Article 102 - Voted: To establish an
electric light on Federal Street.

Article 103 - Voted: To establish a
series light at the head of Brady Avenue.

Resolved:

That the Selectmen are hereby instructed to contract for all work and material necessary in the construction of sewers. That the usual custom of advertising for bids be adopted and that contracts for building and completing same shall be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder.

Carried.

Voted: That a vote of thanks be extended to the moderator of the meeting for the able and impartial manner in which he presided over the meeting and that the Selectmen be instructed to pay him the sum of twenty five dollars for his services.

Voted: That the Teller appointed by the moderator be paid the sum of five dollars each for their services.

Voted: To adjourn
