Permission to Erect a Fish Screen at Outlet
- of Eagle Lake -

To Whom it may concern:

The Board of Fisheries and Game is hereby granted permission to erect and maintain a fish screen without expense to the State at the outlet of Eagle Lake, Mt. Desert, Hancock County, Maine, for the purpose of preventing the fish from escaping from said pond.

Said screen shall be constructed of steel or iron slats not less than $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide and $\frac{3}{8}$ of an inch thick, set upright, each end being bored and the slats strung on rods with $\frac{3}{4}$ inch washers between each slat. Said screen can be made in sections if desired, each section being attached to a "bed" piece and a "top" piece, it shall at all times be kept clear of debris, without expense to the State so as not to interfere with the natural passage of the water from said outlet.

Motion to reconsider Art. 92 was lost.

Article 93- Voted: That the town way as described in Art. 93 be accepted.

On Wednesday, March 4th, at 10.00 A.M. a motion was made to indefinitely postpone Art. 95. The motion was lost.

Article 98- Voted: That it is the policy of the Town not to insure its school buildings.

Article 99- E. S. Clark made the following motion which was lost, the vote being 114 to 88 yea.

"That the Town buy the stocks of the Green Mountain Carriage Road Company for a sum not exceeding two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) and that the Selectmen be instructed to lay out a Carriage road up Green Mountain and raise the said sum."

A motion to reconsider this action was lost by a vote of 108 to 102.

Article 100- Voted: To raise two hundred and seventeen dollars (\$217) to erect and maintain a fish screen at the outlet of Eagle Lake.

Section 31:- Every building more than two stories in height, occupied as a tenement by two or more families, or as boarding or lodging house, or as a factory or workshop, shall have as a means of egress in case of fire a free and unobstructed stairway from the top floor to the first floor entrance, and in addition thereto shall have, with reference to its height, construction, and the number of its occupants, suitable fire escapes

of iron strong enough to sustain a weight of at least seventy pounds (70 lbs.) to the square foot, so arranged as to be easy of access from each floor and leading to some street, alley, or other unobstructed location.

These fire escapes shall be securely fastened to building by bolts passing through the walls and secured on the inside with suitable washers with nuts or keys, and shall have strong iron rails fastened to building in same manner.

Free passage to these fire escapes shall not be obstructed by electric light or other wires.

Whod: That the following be substituted for Section 33 of the Building Ordinances adopted in 1901.

Section 33:- No structure except Cornices, water tables, window caps and sills, and outside means of egress shall be placed upon any building so as to project into or over any public way or square, and no cornice shall project more than three feet (3 ft.)

Whod: to accept the following:

Section 42:- That hereafter no frame or wooden buildings shall be built nearer than three feet (3 ft.) of the side and rear lines of any lot, and in case of two or more buildings on the same lot there shall be six feet (6 ft.) clear space between the walls, unless party walls are built with tuckwork or other fireproof material.

When the lot is bounded by a private way or alley not less than eight feet (8 ft.) wide, buildings may be built to the line of said way or alley, but in such case they shall be provided with proper rainwater gutters and leaders, as required under Section 26. of these laws.

When buildings are separated as required, the passage between shall not be obstructed by any stairways, porches, steps, or any other obstruction preventing a free passage between the buildings for firemen.

Party walls shall not be less than twelve inches (12") thick above the foundation wall and

shall extend not less than three feet (3 ft.) above the roof boards, the end of floor beams, rafters, purlins, etc., shall be so separated that four inches (4") of fireproof material will be between the timbers where they rest on said walls.

Where doorways are placed in party walls they shall be furnished with doors covered with sheet iron or tin, and all such doors are to be self-closing either by means of a stiff spring or by weight and chain running over pulley, all arranged satisfactory to the Inspector of Buildings.

Carried.

Article 104- Voted: That the Town have all the Town Ordinances, building and sanitary laws, police regulations, license laws etc., compiled and printed in book form, and that the Selectmen be and are hereby instructed to have such compilation and publication made.

Article 105- Voted: To authorize the selectmen to make a temporary loan in anticipation of taxes of 1908. Said loan not to exceed forty five thousand dollars (\$45,000.)

Article 106- Voted: To indefinitely postpone.

Article 107- Voted: To indefinitely postpone.

Article 108- Voted: To construct a permanent sidewalk on Greely Avenue and raise seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750.) for same.

Article 109- Voted: To raise Eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500.) to pay discount on taxes.

Article 110- Voted: To indefinitely postpone.

Article 111 - Voted: To lay this article on the table to be taken up at an adjourned meeting to be held May 6th, 1908.

Article 112 - Charles B. Quinn made the following motion:

That any and all parts of the Old Eagle Lake Road so called now closed by vote of the town of Eden to the use of Automobiles be and the same is thereby opened to the use of Automobiles or other motor vehicles propelled by power.

E. S. Clark made a motion to indefinitely postpone Art. 112, which was carried by a vote of 415 yeas to 174 nays.

Motion to reconsider this action was lost.

Article 113 - Voted: To authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue the towns negotiable notes or bonds for a sum not exceeding twenty one thousand dollars (\$21,000.) to complete and equip the New High School Building now in process of construction.

Article 114 - Voted: To indefinitely postpone

Article 115 - Voted: To indefinitely postpone

Article 116 - Voted: To indefinitely postpone.

Article 117 - Voted: To have the old fire engine repaired.

Article 118 - Voted: To authorize and instruct the selectmen to negotiate for the sale and transfer of any property or properties for which it now holds tax deeds and to execute the proper release or transfer of the same.

The following resolution was presented by William Denuelly and unanimously adopted:

Resolved: That the Selectmen and Street Commissioners be requested, before any contracts are let for sprinkling streets, to investigate the advisability of using oil instead of water.

The following resolution was presented by Prof. L. Hodley and unanimously adopted:

Resolved: That the town instruct the Superintending School Committee to continue the school at Old's Park for the ensuing year if in either judgement it is deemed best.

Voted: That the Selectmen be and are hereby instructed to pay the Tellers five dollars each for their services at this meeting.

Voted: That the Selectmen be and are hereby instructed to pay the moderator the usual compensation for his services.

A rising vote of thanks was extended to the Moderator for the able and impartial manner in which he has presided over this meeting.

Voted: To adjourn to May 6th, 1908 at 10.00 A.M.
